- 1 The Board delegates to the Director of Schools the responsibility of developing specific codes of
- 2 conduct which are appropriate for each level of school. Codes of conduct for students in pre-
- 3 kindergarten or kindergarten shall utilize alternative disciplinary practices such as alternative seating,
- 4 consulting with parents, counseling, referral to support services, and trauma-informed support practices
- 5 (not an exclusive listing). Exclusionary discipline shall only be used as a measure of last resort.<sup>2</sup> The
- 6 development of each code shall involve principals and staff members of each level and shall be based
- 7 on evidence-based behaviors supports and interventions.<sup>3</sup>
- 8 The following levels of misbehavior and disciplinary procedures and options are standards designed to
- 9 protect all members of the educational community in the exercise of their rights and duties and to
- maintain a safe learning environment where orderly learning is possible and encouraged.<sup>4</sup> These
- misbehaviors apply to student conduct on school buses, on school property, and while students are on
- school-sponsored outings. Staff members have the authority to enforce the code of conduct<sup>3</sup> and shall
- ensure that disciplinary measures are implemented in a manner that:<sup>5</sup>
  - 1. Balances accountability with an understanding of traumatic behavior;
- 15
  2. Teaches school and classroom rules while reinforcing that violent or abu
  - 2. Teaches school and classroom rules while reinforcing that violent or abusive behavior is not allowed at school;
  - 3. Minimizes disruptions to education with an emphasis on positive behavioral supports and behavioral intervention plans;
  - 4. Creates consistent rules and consequences; and
- 5. Models respectful, non-violent relationships.
- In order to ensure that these goals are accomplished, the school district shall utilize the following
- trauma-informed discipline practices (not an exclusive listing): restorative practices (when applicable),
- 27 multi-tiered system of supports, development of behavior intervention plans, referral to counseling,
- referral to support services. Principals shall use appropriate discipline management techniques when
- 29 enforcing the code of conduct.

## MISBEHAVIORS: LEVEL I

- 31 This level includes minor misbehavior on the part of the student which impedes orderly classroom
- 32 guidelines or interferes with the orderly operation of the school but which can usually be handled by an
- 33 individual staff member.

34	administrative personnel.

15	This level of misbehavior includes acts which result in violence to another's person or property or		
16	which pose a threat to the safety of others in the school. These acts are so serious that they usually		
17	require administrative actions which result in the immediate removal of the student from the school,		
18	the intervention of law enforcement authorities, and/or action by the Board.		
19	If a student's action poses a threat to the safety of others in the school, a teacher, principal, school		
20	employee, or school bus driver may use reasonable force when necessary to prevent bodily harm or		
21	death to another person. <sup>7</sup>
