Our annual Spring Concert and Art Show is May 20th. The concert will start at 7:00 pm. 2025-2026 School Budget

The Board of Education adopted the proposed 2025-2026 budget in the amount of \$6,365,854 at its April 10th meeting, resulting in a spending increase over the current year's budget of \$193,819 or 3.14%. The proposed budget continues funding for all programs and services that are included in the current year's budget with the addition of making our School Resource Officer full time. The proposed budget included a 4.32% tax levy increase, and the estimated tax rate is \$8.86 per \$1,000 of assessed value in Minerva and \$8.87 in Chester.

School Board Election

There is one person running for one open board seat in this year's school board election: Hayley Killon. She is running for , One (1) five (5) year term commencing July 1, 2025 and expiring June 30, 2030.

The official budget statement will be mailed Wednesday, May 7th, and the property tax report card will be in the mail Friday, May 9th. Detailed copies of the budget will be available in the business office and on the school website. Home Communication

Dear Guardian,

Your child's 7th grade science class is starting a unit called, *How do changes in the Earth's system impact our communities and what can we do about it?* as part of the OpenSciEd middle school science curriculum. This unit builds science ideas around Earth's resources and human impact, specifically, related to why our communities are experiencing more droughts and floods.



While reading news stories and headlines, students are introduced to what's starting to become a disturbing new normal: droughts and floods across the US. As different as they are, students recognize that rising temperatures are connected somehow. As the unit progresses, students examine how small changes could lead to large disruptions to community water resources. Meanwhile, students define, investigate, and explain what could be the cause of all these temperature changes and flood and drought events.

Students work with data to examine how present-day human activities are changing the Earth, creating an imbalance in carbon between the Earth and its atmosphere. By defining the problem, students work to brainstorm and evaluate different kinds of solutions for particular communities, including their own.

Helping your child make sense of their learning:

- Encourage your child to talk more about what they are learning in class and give examples.
- Ask your child to reflect on how their individual actions might impact broader populations.
- Ask your child to share what they have learned about droughts, floods, and warming temperatures, and discuss with them how your own community might be experiencing changes.
- Encourage your child to start constructing their own local water story. For example, how has the amount of water changed in your local community? Who and what might be connected to the changing amounts of water?
- Rephrase or paraphrase what your child says as a way to clarify their ideas. Hearing their idea from someone else is a powerful reflective tool for a child.


