## Books We Read

Evergreen by Belva Plain - This intensely moving story of Anna Friedman, who came to the golden shores of America in search of a better life, is a richly human canvas of lives intimately interwoven.

Spring of the Tiger by Victoria Holt - This is a romance written by a prolific writer with a popular style.

Rebecca by Daphne DuMaurier - In this suspenseful novel, the reader is faintly aware that something startling is about to happen.

Chesapeake by James A. Michener - This enthralling novel tells a magnificient historical saga of our land and its people, focusing on the generations of seven families living on Maryland's Chesapeake Bay.

The President's Lady by Irving Stone - The political and personal life of Andrew Jackson and his wife Rachel is depicted with brilliant insight.

The Ring by Danielle Steel - This novel sweeps across the dramatic years of World War II and is an unforgetable story of families driven apart by overwhelming passions.

The Book of the Dun Cow by Walter Wangerin, Jr. - It tells of violence and despair, passion and compassion, laughter and tears, and the ultimate triumph of goodness.

The Light in the Forest by Conrad Richter - This is the unforgetable story of a white boy reared by Indians. True Son is torn between the claims of blood and loyalty.

The Once and Future King by T.H. White - This is a fantastic novel which tells the legends of King Arthur, Merlin the Magician, Robin Hood, Sir Lancelot, Guenever, and the Knights of the Round Table in interesting detail. It is wellwritten and very amusing.

The Scarlet Letter by Nathaniel Hawthorne - An ardent young women, her cowardly lover, and her aging, vengeful husband are the central characters in this stark drama of the conflict between passion and convention in the harsh Puritan world of seventeenth-century Boston.

To Kill A Mockingbird by Harper Lee - Two children in a small town in Alabama learn a lesson about moral principles when their father is appointed to defend a Negro on a rape charge.

The Count of Monte Cristo by Alexander Dumas - Set against the flaming years of the Napoleonic era, here is the celebrated story of Edmond Dantes, a man sentenced to life imprisonment for a crime he did not commit, who escaped from the notorious and impregnable fortress, the Chateau d'If, to exact a terrible vengeance on his enemies.

The Chosen by Chaim Potok - This is a moving story about the friendship between two Jewish boys. Much can be learned about true friendship and the Jewish religion.

Darkness At Noon by Arthur Koestler - Its hero is an aging revolutionary, imprisoned and psychologically tortured by the Party to which he has dedicated his life. It is almost unbearably vivid in its depiction of one man's solitary agony.

## Records We Heard

Albums of the 80 's were in a class by themselves. Records of all kinds became popular in the last year.

The title song from Air Supply's new album "The One That You Love" made the top 10 along with Olivia Newton John's smash hit "Physical" from her album of the same title.

Billy Joel did it again with his "Songs in the Attic" cut, "Say Goodbye to Hollywood." The album "Long Distance Voyager's" "Gemini Dream" introduced a new revival for the Moody Blues Band.

In Southern Rock, Alabama's "Feels So Right" proved those Southern boys could really sing. "The Night Owls," sung by the Little River Band was a big hit from their album "Time Exposure."

The Oak Ridge Boys and Ronnie Milsap headed the country scene. A great return to the top was made by George Jones with his Grammy Award winning hit single, "He Stopped Loving Her Today."

## Jets Fly To Super Season

The 1981-82 Jets, coming off a rebuilding year, were led by six seniors to an outstanding season. This year's Jets played the toughest schedule in the school's history and one of the toughest in the state.

The Jets began preparation at summer camp where thy played some of the best teams in East Tennessee. They also played many scrimmage games in preseason practice.
The team opened the regular season with a 52-45 loss to the strong Farragut Admirals, after which they reeled off five straight victories.

In the Jets' encounter with district rival Bradley Central, although they played well, they lost by a six-point magin. Paul Mills had a career high 35 points. In the next game the Jets bounced back from this disappointing loss by defeating the McMinn County Cherokees.

The Jets traveled to upper East Tennessee for the Kingsport Doubleheader. The first night they faced Kinsgsport Dobyns-Bennett and played well for three-and-a-half quarters before finally
losing to the perennial power. The long trip and the emotionally draining loss seemed to take their toll on the Jets the next night against Elizabethton. Though they played well the first half, they could not stop the Cylclone's victory. The Jets' season before Christmas ended with a $6-4$ record.

The Jet Cagers resumed play after Christmas at the White County Invitational Tournament. They had prepared well over the holidays and won the tournament by defeating both Van Buren County in the semi-finals and the host Sparta Warriors in the finals.

The Jets invaded Livingston hoping to avenge a six-game losing streak to the Wildcats in their gym that began during head coach Mark Bray's first year at the Jet helm. A last second shot was the Jets' downfall and stretched the streak of losses to seven. Tom LaMasters had a season high of 18 rebounds.

The Jets were victorious against Warren, Bledsoe and Dekalb counties. In the Dekalb game Doug Loveday had a career high of 20 points.

Next the Jets faced a much improved

Murfreesboro Oakland who avenged an earlier loss to Bray's Bombers at home. The Jets traveled to Rhea County four days later and lost their second straight. Ronnie Cox scored his season high of 24 points.

After Rhea County the Jets hit a hot streak and won six straight district games, two each against East Ridge and Red Bank, and single victories over McMinn County and Bradley Central. In the McMinn game Jimmy Griswold had his season high of 21 points. The Bradley Central win gave us a split with the perennial district power.

The Jets won three straight victories over district team Red Bank, East Ridge, and a 54-41 Spirit Day win over Red Bank. These victories preceded wins over Rockwood, in which the Jets set a new school rebounding record with 61, and York. These victories stretched the Jets overall record to 20-7 and a second place finish in the district.
Paul Mills, Jimmy Griswold and Doug Loveday were named to All-District honors.



Rita Baldwin, a 5 '10" forward, really found a home under the basket as an excellent defensive player and was voted as the most improved player on her team. She was also voted to All District team with honorable mention on the All Tri-State team.

Dianne Elmore was a $5^{\prime} 7$ ' guard whose ball control and defensive play were a great asset to the Lady Jets. Dianne was also voted as the most improved player on her team.

Michelle Holloway, a 5'8" guard, led her team in assists. Michelle was voted Most Valuable Player on her team, was selected to the All District team, and won honorable mention All Tri-State.


Teresa Sherrill was the team's center. At 5' $11^{\prime \prime}$ she was not only good at tip offs but also rebounding. Teresa had the highest field goal accuracy percentage on the team and was selected All District, All Regional, and second team All TriState.

This loss tied the Lady Jets with Bradley in district play, but the Lady Jets claimed first place a few weeks later when Bradley lost to Rhea County. The Lady Jets kept on flying through the district with another victory over McMinn County.

The Lady Jets defeated two district rivals, Red Bank and East Ridge, to claim their seventh and eighth district wins of the season. The Red Bank Lionesses were the opponents on the most exciting night of the season, the Spirit Day game, and were soundly defeated 50-32.

Rockwood fell prey to the Lady Jets as they rolled to their twenty third victory. York, unfortunately, was more than the girls could handle as they went down in defeat $43-46$, capping off a brilliant 23-5 season record and capturing first place in the district.

Johnny Warner, named Offensive Player of the 1981 Industrial Bowl, grabbed the Panthers by the tail on the first play of the game and never stopped twisting. His two touchdowns in the game's opening three minutes sparked Jets and fans and forecast the final 35-18 Jet victory in Lafayette on November 14.
Warner ran the opening kickoff 87 yards for a touchdown, and within three minutes scored again after recovering a Panther fumble and racing 67 yards into the endzone.
Scott Fisher's two extra-point kicks boosted the score to a 14 point lead with 8:57 remaining in the first quarter. With a 78 -yard drive, the Panthers moved in 12 plays to score. Their point after attempt failed, resulting in a 14-6 first quarter score.
Late in the second quarter Jet Jonathan Loveday recovered a Portland fumble on the Jet 31 to set up the next Big Blue touchdown. Once again Johnny Warner fired through the line, this time for a run of 51 yards and his team's third six-point play. Fisher's point after upped the score to 21-6.
On the first play after the kickoff, sophomore Dale Matherly punctured Portland's hopes when he scrambled to cover the quarterback's fumble on the Panters' 12 yard line. Warner's five and seven-yard runs, accompanied by Fisher's extra point kick, posted a $28-6$ score at halftime.
The opening drive of the second half proved Portland meant business. They drove 79 yards in 12 plays to score from the 12 -yard line. Matherly pounded the Panther quarterback to thwart the attempted two-point conversion.
Eating up the clock on their next drive, the Jets marched 80 yards in 14 plays. Their well-executed offense was capped off by Donnie Melton's 18 -yard run through right guard. This touchdown and Fisher's point after added seven more points on the scoreboard. Fisher was successful in all of his five extra point attempts.

The next ten minutes resulted in a defensive battle. The Panthers rallied in the last four minutes of the game to boost their score to 18. Their attempted run for a final two points failed.

Brian Swearengen, defensive leader and linebacker, was named Defensive Player of the Game.
The game's final 35-18 score enabled the 1981 Jet team to capture the team's first bowl title since 1965 when coaches Dan Van Winkle and Hollis Bolin played as sophomores at C.C.H.S.
