Those of you who were the "dear public" remember a thrill, a laugh a minute, and several members of the Senior Class in their play, "Look Who's Here."



Irece Chelette: Then there was the senior play, "Look Who's Here" with Wanetta and Dilson making oh—what-a-couple!


Marion Hamburg: Don't forget that Pee Wee and Harold made the Honor Society.




THIRD: The individual members of the Senior Class leave the following:


