Science Fair



Use the different sections of this letter to begin conversations with your child about what he or she is learning.

Big Idea: How is science put into action?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: Ruby Goldberg's Bright Idea

Summary: Ruby Goldberg is an inventor, but she does not always invent at the right moment. She also has a reputation of ruining things for her classmates. During shared reading time, Ruby builds a page-turning device from string, a clothespin, a ruler, and a pocket fan, but to no one's surprise, it disrupts the class.

DISCUSS with your child how scientists collaborate and what they learn from each other.
