specializes in storytelling and puppetry. I can't wait to bring even more creativity and excitement into our classroom, building on the fun we're already having!

<u>Language Arts & Math</u>

We've been focusing on listening to stories and remembering the details in the order they were told. The students are practicing recalling events as they happened and working hard on decoding words by breaking them down letter



by letter with their corresponding sounds. In Math, we've been having fun with addition and subtraction, focusing on concepts like Paddy Plus and Minnie Minus. The students are learning how adding and subtracting zero works (e.g., 4 - 0 = 4), and we're also practicing doubles, like 3 + 3 and 4 + 4. They've especially enjoyed learning how to find numbers that are one more or one less than a double!
