
The Role of Regional Superintendent

Since 1865, the Regional Superintendents of Schools have served Illinois with distinction for over 150 years. The Regional Superintendent shall exercise supervision and control over all school districts in the region. "The Regional Superintendent of Schools," is the chief administrative officer of a Regional Office of Education.

As an intermediate agency between the Illinois State Board of Education and local school districts, the office of the Regional Superintendent performs regulatory functions as directed by the Illinois School Code. Illinois School Code states that the Regional Superintendent of Schools:

Shall act as the official advisor and assistant of the school officers and teachers in this region. In the performance of this duty she/he shall carry out the advice of the State Superintendent of Education.

In addition to coordinating and delivering state and local services, the Regional Superintendent acts as an advocate for education by providing positive leadership and disseminating information for educators, school districts, and the public.

ROE Programs

Regional Alternative Education Services (R.A.E.S.)

The Regional Alternative Education Services (R.A.E.S.) is a ROE #33 ran alternative school for students that serves Henderson, Knox, Mercer, and Warren counties. We serve students who for variety of reasons need an alternative educational setting to be successful academically. Our programs use a combination of online curriculum through Edgenuity and I-Pathways, and teacher-led instruction, to meet the diverse learning styles of our students. Our R.A.E.S. staff recognizes the individual and unique student needs in our programs and strive to meet those needs.

The school operates as one collective entity although it has two locations to better serve our students. RAES East is located in Galesburg and serves Galesburg, Knoxville, Williamsfield, R.O.W.V.A. and Abingdon/Avon school districts. RAES West is located in Monmouth, and services Monmouth/Roseville, Mercer, United and West Central school districts.

RAES offers a comprehensive and robust selection of academic programs:

RAES Day High School Diploma Program:

 Located in both Galesburg and Monmouth and serves students from 6th through 12th grade.

RAES Adult Education Program:

- Located in Galesburg, Monmouth and Carthage.
- Offers evening HiSet/GED courses for individuals 16 years of age and older seeking their GED or High School Equivalency Certificate.

RAES Adult ESL Program:

- Located in Galesburg and Monmouth and services students 16 years of age and older.
- Offers English as a Second Language courses that are developed to educate non-speaking students how to speak, read and write English.

Family Literacy Program

The Regional Office of Education's Family Literacy Program is funded through the Illinois Secretary of State Penny Severns Family Literacy grant in collaboration with the Warren County Library. The five component family program offers English as a second language and Adult Education programs for adults. Parenting Education and Play Groups are available for the entire family, as well as, a birth to three classroom for children while their parents attend classes.

ROE Programs, continued.

Early Childhood Programs

Early Childhood Prevention Initiative serves families in Henderson, Knox, Mercer and Warren counties with children ages prenatal through 3 years old. It is centered around family well being, child development and common areas of concern for parents. The mission is to partner with parents to strengthen families and design an environment which maximizes each child's potential.

The Early Childhood Preschool for All serves for ages three to five, assists in developmentally age appropriate experiences that focus on social/emotional language and pre-literacy development. While meeting individual needs first, all children have the opportunity to participate in authentic learning experiences that enhance their innate love of learning.

21st Century Community Learning Center

The Regional Office of Education #33 has received federal funding through a competitive grant process through ISBE for *Mercer County High School, Monmouth-Roseville Junior High School, Monmouth-Roseville High School, Galesburg High School, Abingdon-Avon High School and United High School* to offer program support of 21st Century Community Learning Centers.

These centers are to provide academic enrichment opportunities during non-school hours for district students. The intent of these programs are to help students meet state and local standards in core academic subjects, such as reading and math; offers students a broad array of enrichment activities that can complement their regular academic programs; and offers literacy and other educational services to the families of participating youths. Students may expand their learning beyond the normal school day to better prepare for future jobs or college coursework whatever their chosen pathway leads them to successful life-long learning.

Truancy & Homeless Education

The ROE #33 provides Truancy Intervention and Prevention to potential truants, truants, and chronic truants. Truancy staff identify students through a system of referrals by participating school districts and take corrective action through a series of steps. In 2018 the ROE #33 put in place the Truancy Review Board to deter truancy and correct truant behavior. Upon the 15th unexcused absence, the student and parent/guardian will be sent a Legal Notice to Appear before the Truancy Review Board in the County they reside.

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act of 1987 is a United States federal law that provides federal money for homeless shelter programs. Unaccompanied Homeless Youths include young people who have run away from home, been thrown out of their homes, and/or abandoned by parents/guardians or caregivers. Unaccompanied youths have the same rights as other students experiencing homelessness and face unique barriers to enrolling and succeeding in school.

PD Consortium

The Regional Office of Education #33 is part of a Professional Development Consortium with the Regional Office of Education #26. The PD Consortium offers the professional development tools to succeed through its workshops, face-to-face trainings, conferences, and partnerships to offer online opportunities.

Geography Bowl

The Regional Office of Education #33 has been hosting the Knox County Geography Bowl since 1996. There are two divisions: Elementary and Junior High. Each team consists of 5 players and up to 5 alternates.

The competition is held entirely within one day and will be conducted as a tournament depending on the number of teams present. Each round includes 20 questions within topics ranging from local to world geography.

County Spelling Bees

The ROE #33 organizes the annual regional spelling bee for Henderson, Knox, Mercer and Warren counties and gives local students the opportunity to participate in the Scripps National Spelling Bee.




Ken Russel 5th Grade Outdoor Education Day

Ken Russel has been a district fish biologist in west-central Illinois for over 53 years and was recently honored at the 2018 Fifth Grade Outdoor Education Day for Knox County where the event was renamed in his honor.

The Ken Russel Outdoor Education day is an annual event which gives students an opportunity to get out of the classroom and enjoy the outdoors. A variety of "hands-on" educational wildlife stations are provided for the students. Some of the many stations included fishing, butterflies, geocaching, recycling, aquatics, outdoor adventure and nutrition.

Approximately 500 fifth grade students from Knox County and 50 volunteers participate annually.




