

I was born in the fall of 1955. Coach John Conzemius had just completed his fifth season at the helm of the Wadena High School football team. Coach retired after the 1981 season. Many of his players went on to compete at the college level including one who was All-Big 10 for the Minnesota Gophers and later, an NFL All-Pro for the Pittsburgh Steelers. 
The "WHS Football Scrapbooks," for each decade of his tenure, are dedicated to coach Conzemius, a great teacher of both the game of football and of the lessons of life.

The Beginning

The Wadena High School football program started in 1903. The high school athletic teams' nickname of "Indians" came from the town's namesake, the great Ojibwe Chief Wadena, who lived in the later part of the 19th century.

In the 1980's the Wadena and Deer Creek school districts merged and the new WDC athletic teams' nickname was changed to the "Wolverines."

The pages that follow are about the history of WHS football in the 1960's. In addition to this "Scrapbook" there are three separate "WHS Football Scrapbooks." One for the 1950's and one for the 1970's. The first "WHS Football Scrapbook", released in the fall of 2022, covers the first five decades, from 1900-1949.

Rosters, records, team, and individual achievements are provided where possible. Accuracy has been a goal but cannot be guaranteed. Feedback to provide missing information, or to point out inaccurate information, is encouraged. Old memorabilia including team and individual player photos would also be appreciated.

After a disappointing 1-8 record last year the 1961 WHS team was determined to do better. I wonder if anyone was anticipating what was about to transpire?



Indians Sting Yellowjackets 6-0



Keep Goal Line Uncrossed; Will **Meet Staples Here**

It was largely a battle of two good defensive football teams on the Wadena gridiron Friday night as the Wadena Indian's had as their "guests" the Perham Yellowjackets. For over three quarters of the game the two teams battled without either being able to cross the goal line. Then about midway in the final quarter the Indians managed to put across a TD which proved to be the only scoring of the game. It ended 6-0

Throughout much of the game the action was in the area of the center of the field. The Indians had a margin in first downs, but ans got second wind and went to when they penetrated to within the 20-yard line the Yellowjackets seemed to gather extra defensive strength and thwarted any The first play brought it to the scoring tries.

At one point in the first quarter the Yellowjackets worked the ball down to the Wadena 13-yard line and gave a scare to the Indians and their fans. However, the Wadena boys were up to the defensive needs and stopped the penetration at that point and took over on downs. In this In this quarter Dave Zosel sent two nice passes into the arms of receivers for good gains. One of the passes was to Mike Merickel and the other to Tom Fahey.

Not long after the second quarter had opened the Perham team had worked the ball to the midfield stripe but there, with a fourth down and five to go situation they punted. The kick went down to the five-yard line where Dave Zosel took it. With the help of good blocking by others of the Indians, he scampered back to the 35 for a good return. From that point the Indians put on perhaps their best march of the evening with a good variety of plays, including passes and truns, they went to the Perham lifive yard line. Here it was first down. In succeeding plays the Indians advanced as far as the two, but then were shoved back

ito; the five and there lost the bull on downs.

It was ionly a couple of plays later that the half ended with both goal lines still uncrossed.

As the second half opened Perham received the kickoff. They put on the beginning of what threatened to be a good march until Tom Fahey broke through and stopped the passer for a healthy loss on one play and the visitors were forced to kick. At the end of the third quarter the scoreboard still had two big zeros posted for the score.

Perham then, after getting the kickoff, went to the air in an attempt to even the score and go ahead. One pass of nearly 50 yards was almost complete and shortly, after another one was taken by two players, one from each team. It squirted out to of their hands and into the hands of one of the Indians who thus gained possession. They marched up to about their 35 and then Perham held to force a kick. On the first try into the air by the Yellowjackets, Merickel intercepted and the Indians were able to run out the clock on straight up the middle plays.

The Perham team was big and had some dandy ball players in action and they proved the toughest team for the Indians thus far this season.

Indians Stomped Staples for 13

Homecoming Win Came In Second Half Of Game

It was pretty much like one of the Indians said several days before the game, "When they come 25 but being stopped there. here Staples is always tough." And that was the case Friday Friday evening as the Staples Cardinals) invaded the Indians football field. The Cardinals were tough. But in the end the Indians came out of the fray with a nifty 13 - 0 win.

The interesting part of the con-test, however, is the fact the Wadena goal line was uncrossed in that game, and that makes it four in a row in which the opponents haven't been able to score against the Indians. In fact the closest any one team has come to the Indians goal line was the 13-yard line and that was by, Perham a week earlier.

The game Friday night was a typical Staples - Wadena affair with some good hard football on the part of all the players in ac-tion. Play was spirited all the way through with the Cardinals striving up to the last play of the game to at least put a blemish on that Indian goal line.

There were some breaks, and it must be said most of these were in favor of the Indians Friday. On the opening kickoff the first one came. Wadena kicked to Staples. The kick was low and short and hit a Staples lineman who couldn't hang on to the ball and in the scramble it was recovered by Wadena on the Staples 44. From that point a variety of plays' mostly through the line carried the ball to the 15, but there Staples held and the Indians relinquished possession.



On the first play from scrimmage by the Cardinals Botthoff scampered for about 15 yards to put some awe into the minds of the Indians and their followers. After that progress was slower and the Cards had to kick with Zosel taking the ball on his own

The Indians started a march which carried them to midfield, but a penalty of 15 yards hurt and they kicked with Staples taking the ball on the 30. Matonich showed a burst of power and speed and went for about 16 yards to the 46. A succession of other plays carried the ball to the Indians 32, but then a 15 yard penalty set the Cards back to near the midfield strip and here the quarter ended with, no score.

In the early minutes of the second quarter the Cards kicked and the Indians had a try at moving the ball with some success but not enough and they kicked to the 30 where the Cards again took over and moved the ball up past the midfield stripe, but then were held and they kicked with Jarvela taking the ball on the 28 and moving back to the 35. There wasn't too much success in this series of downs and the ball went back to the Cardinals and aften a series of downs without much success they kicked and the Indians had possession as the half ended still scoreless.

About midway in the third quarter Wadena scored. This This came after the Indians had taken the kickoff and moved the ball steadily from their own 27 to the Staples 37. From that point Bob Sundahl found the opening in the Staples line and scampered thru for the longest run of the even-Some dandy ing to pay dirt. blocking helped clear the path for Bob. The try for point was a little wide and there was a 6 - 0 lead.

Staples took the kickoff and started to move, but then on one play the ball carrier was trapped for a long loss and the Cards kicked. This however was block-


ed as Bob Ferris got possession for the Indians on the 25. This was and important break for the Indians and they were right there to capitalize on it. The touchdown play was a quarterback sneak by Zosel from the six inch mark. This time the try for point was good and the in-

dians led 13 - 0. In the fourth quarter Staples was playing good ball and started to move well at one point only to have two 15-yard penalties in one series of downs set them The Cards kept at it back. though as the play progressed. They advanced deep into Indian territory a couple of times, and once a definite threat was blocked as Merickel intercepted a pass on the 25.

For the Indians there was good play by the entire team, linemen and back alike and Coach John Conzemius put the boys in and out of the game steadily and had many good working combina-tions. The Staples backfield has tions. The Staples backfield has some fast men, and with more experience these promise to be tough in upcoming games and another year.

It was a game with thrills, and one in which the opposing teams can consider they did a good job of playing top notch high school football..

Tomorrow, Friday, night the Indians go to Breckenridge. It's going to be Homecoming at Breck and those boys will be inspired. The Indians, too, will be determined to keep that dandy 4 wins, no loss, season record intact,





It was the sixth straight victory for the Wadena Indians football team as they outlasted the Crosby - Ironton Rangers at the C - I field Friday evening. Final score was 12 - 7 in a good game of football which saw both clubs displaying good power and good defensive ability.

The seven points by Crosby -Ironton were the first scores made this season against the Indians. They came in the third quarter as Jack Fering of the Rangers started on what was expected to be a play for just enough to get a first down again. Fearing started from his own 38, went straight through the middle of the line and neatly avoided being stopped by a couple of linemen, then slipped away from any backfield hinderances and scampered for the TD, going away from pursuers. The point conversion was good. Fearing is a big box — most of the Rang-ers were — and his speed along with his size gave him the needed punch for the run.

The Indians kicked off to start action. The Rangers weren't able to make too much yardage and they soon kicked back to the Indians. A few ground plays gave the Indians a first down near midfield, but then the going was tougher and the ball went back to the home team back on their own 10-yard line. series of efforts the After a Rangers used the punt again and the Indians got it on the C - I 35, but a fumble was recovered by the Rangers to give them a break. Action continued about on this pattern until the guarter ended with no score. It kept up at that rate for a short time in the second quarter when the Indians got the ball on their own 40 as Bob Sundahl took a punt there and ran it back to the Rangers 39. From that point the Indians ground out enough yardage for a first down on the 28. Then Sundahi again took the ball and with a couple of effective blocks being thrown by his teammates, and some shifty running, he was able to scamper the entire 28 yards into pay dirt. The kick was wide and it was 6 - 0.

and it was 6 - 0.

Not long after this the Rangers had to punt again as they couldn't make the yardage necessary for the first down. This series of action for Wadena started on their own 28. From there they marched to midfield and then an interesting play took place. Sather was carrying the ball and making yardage, but as he was about to be downed, flipped a neat pass to Merickel who went on for several more yards to set up the next TD.

to set up the next TD. This play took the ball to the Rangers 43. From there with Zosel, Sather and Sundahl all having a chance at carrying, and all the linemen doing some good work, the second touchdown came shortly after and it was 12 to 0 as the point attempt failed. C - I was making good, steady gains and were getting close to payoff territory in the second quarter, but the Indians held deep and got possession of the ball late in the period to lead 12, to 0 at halftime.

As second half play opened the Indians received the kick and made a march toward centerfield with some progress. However they had to surrender the ball after a penalty had hurt some and a pass play had failed. As they took the ball the Rangers were in their own territory and after a couple of plays had failed to make much yardage they had a third down and four situe



tion on their 38. It was on the next play that Fearing, the husky fullback, wen through the middle of the line and on to the end zone 62 yards away for the touchdown which put an end to the Indians uncrossed goal line of five and a half games this season. The point conversion was good on a plunge over the line and it was 12 - 7.

Some fans had wondered if the Indians might be "shook" when an opponent scored on them, but not the boys in action Friday night. They kept right on at a good pace. After receiving the kickoff they advanced the ball well and were getting a good march going when on an apparent pass play Zosel was trapped back of the line for a substantial loss. A couple of plays later the Indians had to kick. On the first play from scrimmage after getting the ball the Rangers sprung loose a boy for a good 28 yard gain to the 40, but here the Indians held and they took a kick.

From then on to the end of the game the play moved back and forth. As one team neared their opponents goal line they met stiffer opposition. Latevin the game the Rangers moved deep into Indian territory but the Wadena boys were bent on victory and stiffened the line⁵ to taek over possession of the ball with only a minute or so left. Then it was just a matter of running out the clock. The Indians used line plays for only small yardage, making sure they weren't going to fumble and soon they had the win.

What looked like an almost additional scoring chance for the Indians came in the last quar-The Indians were around ter. the Rangers 20 and on fourth down with 10 to go, tried a pass. One of the Rangers, evidently not realizing the situation, intercepted this on his two-yard line and was downed there. Had he merely deflected the ball and prevented it from being caught by the Indians receiver, his team would have taken over on the 20. Maybe he figured possession is nine points of the law.



A football game which had more thrills and excitement for the spectators than any played here for many years was fought out on the Wadena gridiron Wednesday evening of last week. When it was all over the Detroit Lakes high school team and the Wadena team were locked in a tie at 25 - 25.

This one had been predicted as being "the game" of the year, and it certainly lived up to expectations. Both teams played hard, aggressive football from start to finish. The breaks weren't many, but it might be said the Indians may have had a slight advantage in this department.


Also interesting in the game was the fact that it marked the first time this season the Indians had trailed in any game. Their ability to come back from as much as a two-touchdown deficit and go into a lead showed the qualities of a good team.

Also interesting in the game was the fact that within one span of less than five minutes of play on the clock, there were three touchdowns scored, one by the visiting Lakers and two by the Indians. The eight touchdowns scored in the game were the most in any game here for some time. They provided the fans with an abundance of excitement.

The Indians took the opening kickoff on their own 35, but after three tries had gained only a couple of yards and punted, with the ball being downed on the DL 35 with the Lakers in possession. The big boys from the west went right to work and with some good ground gains being mixed in with two completed passes had a touchdown and the conversion within a few minutes to take the lead at 7 - 0. Rogstad and Taves figured prominently in the ground game with Harris on the throwing end of the passing attack. The rest of the first quarter found Wadena having a try at moving the ball with some success, but having to surrender it by the punt route, and then the Hakers having about the same luck and returning the punt. As the quarter ended Wadena had the ball on about the Lakers 40. Detroit Lakes had the lead on the scoreboard, 7 - 0.

Indians fans got their first thrill as far as a sustained march in the early minutes of the second quarter. The boys marched down to the one-balf yard line, but were denied the TD as the Laker line held and took over on downs. Boys carrying the ball on this march were Sather, Zosel and Jarvela. The line play was good to provide some good openings for the ball carriers.

Starting from their own 19-inch line, the Lakers put on a sustain-

ed march which took them down to within the Indians five yard line. At this point the Wadena line held for a couple of downs and then when a Laker back fumbled the ball John Geiser was in there for the recovery. Time was running out and Wadena killed the clock as they had possession and it was still 7 - 0. In the DL drive some good running plays were executed with Brecken and Taves hauling the pigskin for good yardage as the Laker line opened good holes. A few passes by quarterback Harris were mixed in, and these were executed for yardage too.

As the teams lined up for the kickoff on the opening of the second half an exciting period of football action was about to unfold. The Indians kicked and the Lakers took the ball on their own 12. One back started upfield for good yardage, along about the 30-yard stripe, as it appeared he was about to be stopped he lateralled to another back and this fellow was a fast boy. He headed for the goal line and went the distance, the total play being for 88 yards. The Indians were in pursuit for the run, but none were fast enough to over-take the fleeing Laker and the pigskin. Such an opening threw a fear into the Indian fans, but the boys playing football under the Wadena banner weren't upset.

Taking the kickoff on his 22, Sather hiked right along and made it to the 48 before he was stopped. A couple of pass plays were incomplete, but on a third try one of the officials got in the road of the Wadena intended re-The ball was put in play ceiver. on the DL 37. With a first down at this point the Indians moved swiftly and in six plays had the ball in the end zone for the TD. Sather and Zosel registered good gains in this surge, and the payoff play was a pass, Zosel to Jarvela. The conversion effort failed and it was 13 - 6.

Getting the kick on their own 25, the Lakers didn't have as much success in this series of downs, so punted.

Here Dennis Jarvela got the ball on his 10 and went all the way to the DL 48 before he was downed. The Indians had been fired up by their TD of a minute or so earlier and donned extra war paint. On the first play from scrimmage they sprung Mike Sather loose for a 48-yard scamper to the end zone and a touchdown. The try for point was good and the score was tied at 13 each.

There was fire in the eye and desire in the heart of the Indians at this point as they kicked to the Taking the ball deep, Lakers. the Lakers backs tried a handoff on the return. This resulted in a fumble and lineman Bill Heather of the Indians was there. Grabbing the football in the air, he kept right on going into the end zone and another touchdown, this being the one which put the Indians into the lead for the first time. The try for the extra point was missed. At this point, the l Lakers might have had reason to let down, but they had what it took too and after getting the ball on the kick on about their 25, they put together a series of.

plays which soon found them in the Wadena end zone and tieing the ball game again. This series had Taves and Rogstad working on the ground for nice gains, and the Harris to Larson passing combination making added yardages and first downs to move the ball upfield.

Shortly after this the most exciting quarter of football on the local field for a long time was ended.

Opening the last quarter, the Indians kicked on fourth down, the ball being taken by the visiting II on the 16 where it had gone out of bounds.

Taking to the air right away, the Lakers had a pass intercepted as Sather was in the right spot to grab the pigskin and after fumbling it slightly, he downed it on the DL 20. On the next play he moved it just short of a first down, and then Zosel made it first down on the five.

It was Sather to the one and then on a quarterback sneak Zosel was in the end zone. The try for point missed but the Indians had a six point lead. This was with just over eight minutes left.

From this point the Lakers got the kick, but moved for only short yardage, going to the Indi-ans 35 before they had to sur-render possession. This time the Indians had little success and punted to their own 20. In a scramble Wayne Herzog recovered the ball for Wadena but a flag on the play nullified this. On the second kick DL got the ball on their 28. Again the visitors were able to rise to the occasion. The good arm of Harris, plus the catching ability of Larson on pass plays, and with some good run-ning plays they marched the 72 yards which were necessary for the tie score. The TD came with only 20 seconds left to play and the point try failed. It was a running play.

As they kicked, the Lakers played it safe and sent an extremely short kick which they downed. They did manage to run one play before the clock signalled the end of a real thriller.

Names of the backfield men have crept into this story several times, and they all played good ball. Also due for a lot of credit are the linemen on both club.s In looking over our notes we find Wayne Herzog being credited with several good efforts at breaking up plays. Others who were also in their good efforts included Sundby, Fahey, Kresien, Jovonavich, Deline, and others.

Bob Sundahl, who had figured in earlier games, saw action only for about two plays because of a leg injury. He couldn't play to his usual form and it was doubtful if he would see action in the Aitkin game last night.

Some unofficial statistics show that the Indians had 10 first downs to 19 for the Lakers and the passing combination of DL was successful in 12 of 20 efforts. The Indians made three good passes out of six efforts. Penalties were fairly even, but DL was set back a few more yards than Wadena.

Seven From Wadena Team Named To Mid-State Squad

Comprise Nearly Half Of Roster Of 1961 Mythical Team

At the annual meeting of the Mid State Conference schools held late last week, the Wadena Indians were recognized as the conference football champions for the 1961 season. In conference action the Indians had a perfect record of four wins and no losses. Members of the Mid State loop are Park Rapids, Staples, Aitkin, Crosby-Ironton and Wadena.

A highlight of the meeting was selection of the all-conference team. For this mythical squad, 15 men are chosen, and of these the Wadena Indians had several more than any of the other schools. Seven Wadenaites were



As everyone with any interest in sports knows, Wadena is on its way to a most impressive season. The best since 1944, in fact, when the Indians of that day had a 8-0 won-lost record. If the Indians had gone unscored upon for the entire season, it would have been a new record at Wadena High. The only year that the blue and gold have been unscored upon was in 1910, when a 6-0 record was compiled. However, only six games were played and the 1961 schedule has nine games on it. This would tend to indicate a new record since it covers more games, if it ever comes about. At any rate the team and coaches are having an outstanding year. Only six times in history has a Wadena team had a perfect re-cord; in 1910, 1924, 1925, 1932, 1943, & 1944. 

Perham's Yellowjackets, badl stung the week before by Henning, recovered and highly keyed buzzed around the Wadena Indians' football field Friday night for the first 15 minutes in what appeared to be their second win of the young football season.

The 'Jackets swarmed to an early 12-0 lead and it took the INdians' Tribe about one and one half quarters to get over the tenacious sting and fight back for a deserved and hard fought 26-18 victory. It was coaches Conzemius, Larson and Visher's club's third straight win of the season.

The Indians out totalled in yardage 227 to 160 yards, out passed 85 to 4, out first downed 17-16, had to rely on their explosive punts and kickoff returns.

Although Perham did control the ball 58 plays to 29, the Wadena gridders did have the edge on the ground 156 yards to 142. 
gave Wadena a 20-0 third quarter load.

Wadena High School, off to one of its best starts in years with five straight triumphs, moves into the toughest part of its schedule looking for an undefeated season and the Mid-State Conference football title.

Veteran coach John Conzemius, who has been at Wadena since 1951, said possibilities are good with a team that could compare with some of the best in the school's history, including title winners in 1961 and 1962.

Wadena remained tied for the league lead with a 32-6 defeat of Aitkin last week and gets a major test when it is host to Crosby-Ironton, also unbeaten in league play, Friday night. Crosby - Ironton defeated Brainerd 26-19 in a nonloop clash last week. While not a big team, Wadena is quick, Conzemius said, and alert, able to take advantage of opponents with pass interceptions and fumble recoveries.

"We're going to have to wait and see if this is one of our better teams," Conzemius said in pointing to good balance in the Mid-State league and games coming up with Little Falls and Park Rapids as well as a non-league affair with Detroit Lakes. "Staying healthy is important."

A sparkling performer for Wadena has been Kip Browne, a 150-pound halfsback who has scored 11 touchdowns in the first five games, five on punt returns. Furthermore, 10 of those touchdowns have been on runs of 47 to 89 yards.

Against Aitkin, Browne's touchdowns were on 74, 78 and 89-yard runs as he maintained a rushing average of more than seven yards a try.

Mike Butler, a 180-pound junior, plays fullback with Steve Lynk or Scott Pettit, both 150, at the other halfback. Paul Schmidt, 165, and Randy Kern, 160, alternate at quarterback.

While Kern's passing average is just 40 per cent he hasn't had one attempt intercepted.

Greg Willis, 175 and a top pass receiver, and Greg Hall, 170, are the ends. Curt Folkestad, 165, and Scott Knutson, 185, or Douglas Mosman, 165, are tackles; Don Simmons, and Charles Roberts, both 170, the guards and Tim Hall, 155, center.

ovided many thrills for the local football fans, Although the team is to loose many fine seniors the play of the junior va rsity indicates that next year the fans can again watch exciting football.



Friday Night Under the Lights and You're the Quarterback

By Dave Zosel Class of '62 This story has been edited for length.

My football career started early with neighborhood games in Grandma Zosel's yard. I learned from some of the older neighbor boys and was a non-factor in the game but just happy that they let me play. My older brothers, along with the Fossen boys and a few others would gather for the game. The neighborhood super star, whom we youngsters idolized, was Gene Goedel, a standout receiver for the Wadena Indians. I had hopes of someday playing for the Indians too.

By the time **5**th **and 6**th **grade** rolled around I had teamed up with my friends, my brother John, and whoever else might show up for Saturday games at the varsity field. On Friday nights the varsity would play, and we seldom missed a game.

Reg Mead's **7th and 8th grade** team gave us our first crack at organized football. We had two games on the schedule and won them both. In the second game, time was running out when I scooped up a fumble and ran for a last second touchdown to win the game. Now I was sure that someday I would be a Wadena Indian.

During my **freshman year**, coach Don Hamerlinck chose me to quarterback the B team. John Geiser, my good friend from Bluffton, was my center. We learned a lot that year playing with sophomores and juniors. We won a few games and lost more than a few.

When early practice started our sophomore year, I started the season on the B team and dressed for the varsity games. By the third contest of the season, coach Conzemius surprised me by announcing that I was to become the starting quarterback. My stomach dropped to the floor as I contemplated the schedule ahead of us.

Coaches Conzemius and Larson did their best to prepare us. Our next game was to be against the powerful Alexandria team. It would be a real "David and Goliath moment."

Though we played tough to the season's end we came out of it with just one more win after an opening victory at Long Prairie, to end with a 2-6 record.

They say suffering is a great teacher. We had a lot of young players on that team and most of the time we came away licking our wounds. But we were building for the future. As a junior I was playing both ways, and also punting and returning punts.

Senior Year (fall of 1961)

Our senior year came around with great anticipation. We had experience across the line and we were talented in the backfield. Our coaches were tough and demanding, thinking this could just be our big year. John Conzemius was our head coach. He was competitive and had a strong desire to win. The line coach was Bill Larson, a tough ex-marine. Also, John Campbell (WHS '56), star Rose Bowl champion, Gopher, and eventual NFL All-Pro, worked out with us and helped coach the two weeks before school started.

Our fourth game was homecoming. We would meet the Staples Cardinals, who were coming off another great season By 6:00 we had ankles taped, pads adjusted, and headed in stocking feet to the gym for the pregame plan and the inspirational speech that someone would be invited to deliver. Tonight, it was Reg Mead's dad. He was a retired Methodist pastor from Duluth. He stood up in front of us, trench coat and classic Ivy cap in place. With his surly growl he proceeded to convince us that there was no other option tonight but to win. He reminded us that we were playing for each other, for our coaches, for the pride of our school, and for our own self-respect. The only way to be successful was to operate as a single cog, perfect teamwork, with everyone doing their part. He prayed that the Lord would help us play hard, play fair and be good sports. On that note, with a loud cheer, we headed for the bus.

Homecoming was indeed special. The whole town was excited about our team, and by game time, the stands were packed. After warm-ups, we gathered at the sideline for our final instructions. Staples lined-up for the kickoff and I stood back on the 20-yard line and awaited the kick. I glanced at the stands, checked out where my parents always sat, looked over the field, and glanced up into the lights. This was it – what I had always hoped for. *Friday night, under the lights and I'm the guarterback*. I was truly a Wadena Indian. The sound of the whistle caught my attention. I focused my eyes on the little torpedo tumbling toward me through the misty night air. At that point, training, instinct, and adrenaline take over and you cease to think. You merely react. Homecoming game in the fall of 1961 was underway.

We beat Staples 13-0. Through the first 5 games we were not only unbeaten, but we were un-scored upon. We were starting to get the attention of the sports media around the state. In our final 4 games we did allow a few points, but our only disappointment was a 25-25 tie against Detroit Lakes.

When our season was over, we were 8-0-1, Mid-State Conference Champions, and ranked 5th in the final state poll. As it turned out, our team was coach Conzemius' only undefeated squad in his illustrious 31-year coaching career in Wadena.

What a season it was!


WHS Collegiate Players

There are many WHS alumni that continued playing football after high school. The ones I have identified and included in these "Wadena Football Scrapbooks" are by no means a complete list. I apologize to the ones I have overlooked.

I would like to begin with the "Grand Daddy" of them all. A WHS class of '56 graduate. As I have heard from a reliable source, John Campbell was maybe an above average high school football player. Tall and thin. He joined the Navy after high school and a few years later he was still tall but not so thin. Rather than me telling you what happens after he enrolled at the University of Minnesota, you can read the articles below for yourself.

Honors continued to pour in for the Gophers, should-be football champions today with three members of the famed Minnesota line—Bob Bell, Julie Hook and John Campbell—being named to both all-Big Ten honor teams selected separately by the Associated Press and United Press International.

Bell gained further acclaim by becoming the only repeater on the All-American team selected by the 500-member American Football Coaches Association.

The great Gopher tackle, hub of the still raging discussion on the roughingthe-passer penalty at Wisconsin, was the only unanimous choice on the UPI's All-Big Ten team and shared that distinction with Wisconsin end Pat Richter on the AP all-conference outfit.

Campbell was named a first-team end



by both wire services and Hook, the tremendous linebacker, was honored at guard on both selections.

No other school placed as many as three on the first team. Richter and quarterback Ron VanderKelen gave Big Ten champion Wisconsin two berths on both the AP and UPI teams.

Center Bill Armstrong and halfback Paul Warfield gave Ohio State two representatives on the UPI all-stars and Michigan State gained two AP spots with fullback George Saimes and center Dave Behrman.

The Gophers did well below the first All-Star level, too,

Carl Eller, Minnesota's junior tackle, was honored with a second-team all-conference berth by both services. Bill Munsey was placed at halfback on the third teams by AP and UPI while Duane Blaska was named to the AP's third-team backfield in gaining UPI honorable mention. Fullback Jerry Jones was a third-team choice by UPI and gained AP honorable mention. Center Paul Benson and halfback Jim Cairne also earned UPI honorable mention.

Meanwhile, Coach Murray Warmath himself praised the Gophers again and again—at the Tribune Quarterback Club luncheon and last night at the 46th annual Minneapolis Athletic Club football stag.

Today the Gophers were to elect their captain whose identity as successor to Dick Enga will be announced at Wednesday's 11:30 convocation in Coffman Union.

On the Coaches' All-American, the only other Big Ten players outside of Bell to be picked on the first team were Michigan State's Saimes and Wisconsin's tremendous Richter.

Bits and Pieces of the 1960's

In 2017 I did some research on three Wadena High School basketball players, from the 1950's, that played for my dad Harold Willis (1955-64). Upon completion of that I decided to work my way back in time as far as the archives would take me. The result was the "Wadena H.S. Basketball Scrapbook 1900-59." After that I knew I had to do the same for what came after 1959. Project #2 culminated in the "Wadena H.S. Basketball Scrapbook 1960-80." Neither have been a commercial success. They were never intended to be money makers. Their purpose is to bring back memories, or to confirm a dad's or a grandpa's claim of greatness in their youth. Or at least be forced to modify said claims. And ultimately, I want our Wadena sports history documented.

I resisted the thought of doing something similar for Wadena High School football. It is such a "long haul" process. Time consuming and monotonous. Besides I was a cross country runner in high school. I loved football but wanted to be in shape for the basketball season. Plus, I was not a very good football player. Then I started to think about my youth and WHS football. In 1966, at the age of 11 I was the "water-boy" for the high school football team. My brother Greg was a sophomore on that team. I loved being around those guys.

Then my memory took me back a little further. Dave Campbell* ('66) played for WHS in the falls of 1963-65. He lived on the corner of Dayton Ave and 4th St. SW, just a stone's throw from the football field. Behind his back yard was a playground and behind that, the Wadena elementary school. One beautiful spring day I was at the playground alone. I do remember very clearly sitting under a big tree in Dave's backyard and talking with him. Dave Cambell, quarterback. He was a star football player, and he was talking with me. He may have been my first sports hero. It was then that I realized many of the guys that would be in this football scrapbook were sports heroes to the youth of their era. In the 21st century it is more likely the youth of the day have sports heroes that make \$100's of millions of dollars. That's not a bad thing, it's just a sign of the times. I like the way it was when I was a kid, you could sit down and talk to your sports hero.

Suddenly I had another reason for projects #3 and #4 (completed 2022:

In the early 1900's high school sports were limited to football, basketball, and track & field. The other sports listed above will go through 1980, with their starting date yet TBD.
