

iReady

Over 70 students in four 9th grade English classes served as the pilot group for the iReady computer-based assessment in reading during the week of February 6. iReady is an adaptive test that measures student reading skills in several categories. The testing went smoothly and many of the students were already familiar with the program from taking the iReady math assessment.

The next step in the pilot process is to analyze the data from this pilot group and determine ways to drive instructional strategies. The long-term plan is to roll out this iReady reading assessment to the entire 9th grade class in the fall.

NMHS National Honor Society (NHS) Update

The New Milford High School National Honor Society (NHS) has had a busy school year. In December we collected hundreds of items for a "Stuff a Stocking" donation, filled Christmas boxes for Camilla's Cupboard, and designed and delivered handmade holiday cards for seniors. In January, NHS students collected hundreds of non-perishable items for a food drive. In February, NHS conducted a Valentine's Day rose sale fundraiser and in March, NHS is selling floral bouquets as a fundraiser at all the performances of the NMHS musical. Teacher of the Year Nominations

We are pleased to announce the third year of our revised Teacher of the Year program celebrating the excellence of our districts' teachers.

This program has allowed the opportunity for more teachers to be honored for their exemplary work and dedication to students, families, and colleagues. This year's program will again include naming a Teacher of the Year at each of the district's five schools, then selecting the district Teacher of the Year from those candidates. The program continues to be an overwhelming success. We congratulate the Teachers of the Year who were announced at each school last June. They are Cheryl Reiner at NMHS, Daniel Savo at SMS, Tara Gee at SNIS, Katie Ciperelli at HPS. The district Teacher of the Year, representing NES, Jenna Giudice, was announced during convocation

in August. The Committee has decided that it will again follow this format for the current school year.

According to the CT Department of Education's website, "The Teacher of the Year Program recognizes and honors teacher excellence. It does not attempt to select the "best" teacher; rather, to identify, from among many outstanding teachers of the year, one teacher to serve as a visible and vocal representative of what is best in the profession. The program celebrates excellence in teaching by recognizing teachers who have inspired a love for learning in their students and who have distinguished themselves in the profession."

Beginning on Thursday, March 23rd and continuing until Thursday, April 6th, staff, parents, and students will again be invited to nominate educators that they believe show excellence in teaching. After the nomination process has concluded, a list of eligible candidates will be announced. *Staff at each school will then vote for their school's Teacher of the Year.* Announcements will be made in mid-May as our superintendent, Dr. Janet Parlato, along with members of the committee and this year's Teachers of the Year will surprise each school's new Teacher of the Year with the official announcement. Each Teacher of the Year from all 5 schools will then be given an opportunity to move forward as a nominee for the district title. The full district committee will convene to follow the same process they have followed in the past to choose our district's Teacher of the Year. This educator will then be eligible to submit an application to the State Department of Education for consideration as Connecticut's Teacher of the Year. The teachers' application packet includes biographical and professional information, essays on topics ranging from personal teaching philosophy to the issues facing public education, and letters of endorsement. As was the case in the past, we will continue to expect and encourage our nominees to submit their application to the state after accepting the nomination at our district level.

We encourage you to participate in this process by nominating a colleague that has inspired you and has inspired students. We are excited to celebrate all of our talented and dedicated educators!




