## Miss Fuller's Fantastic First Grade

The first graders came into this year smiling and ready to take on first grade. I am so proud with how hard they have been working these first few months of school. In ELA we have been reading two favorites, *Stellaluna* and *Frog and Toad*. Students have been learning how to determine the main story elements for both of the stories. Our math class has been focused on addition and subtraction strategies. Students have been working on mastering their fact fluency with our holey cards. I am so impressed with how fast they have been able to get with this!

In social studies, we have been learning about our community and the different rules and laws we need to follow. We also began our government unit. One focus was voting. We held our own mini vote on our favorite pets. We sent home ballots to families and they got to choose between a dog, horse, or cat. Dog won by a landslide!!! We also learned about different government services and invited Officer Hunter to come in and talk about his job and how he helps to keep us and everyone safe.

Our science curriculum starts the year off with learning about animals. We have been learning how animals can camouflage to protect themselves. Students got to camouflage their own moths to hide around the classroom. We were so excited to show them off at Open House!

I am looking forward to watching this fantastic group continue to grow this year!





The 2nd graders are working hard and learning so much already this year. They are adjusting nicely to the expectations and routines of the classroom.

In ELA, students learned how to write a narrative using sequencing words. They also learned how to identify pronouns and can identify base words and add suffixes to them. They know all about past, present, and future tense verbs and how to make irregular past tense verbs. They are all working so hard.

In science class, studies how caterpillars turn into butterflies. We learned that all monarch butterflies migrate to Mexico! We also have learned about animal biodiversity and habitats. Did you know that different frogs make different sounds? We listened to the different sounds or "calls" of different frogs and identified them based on what we heard. It was so fun!

In social studies, we are learning about communities and how to work together. Additionally, we are also working on reinforcing and building character traits each month. September was responsibility and October we are working on Honesty.

In math, students worked so hard in module 1 and learned different strategies for addition and subtraction. They are now using vocabulary words such as difference, sum, addends and related facts. We just finished module 2 and we learned all about even and odd numbers. We also learned how to make an array and how to write the addition equation that goes with it.

#### Fall Fun in Fifth Grade!

Fifth grade has been off to a fantastic start this school year! In science, we've been learning about ecosystems and how to keep them healthy. We had the opportunity to walk the school's nature trail to identify local producers, consumers, and decomposers. The class has almost completed our first reading unit where we read a very engaging book titled Night of the Spadefoot Toads, focusing on plot, theme, character development, and setting. Students are also working on a narrative writing unit which focuses on telling a detailed short story that includes conflict, resolution, and dialogue. In math, the class has been working to develop a deeper understanding of place value, as well as multiplication and division of whole numbers. Finally, in social studies, we have been learning about and practicing the inquiry process and how to research a topic for valid information that supports a claim. We've also had the opportunity to meet with Mr. Ferrone, who worked with the class on a technology project that brought student drawings into 3-D using a program on iPads. Overall, since the beginning of the school year, the class has worked hard to develop a strong classroom community where we maintain a growth mindset and respect,

encourage, and support one another. We're looking forward to a fun and busy year ahead!

## **Athletic Announcements**



Thank you for all the support you have shown our athletic programs. Your support

is key to keeping these programs running and to getting more students involved. The soccer and cross country seasons were a huge success. While the cross country team is still going, others are turning their eyes towards basketball and Nordic skiing. If your student athlete has not had a physical in the last year please get one scheduled for them. Please make sure that ALL paperwork is being returned promptly. Coaches, ADs, and School nurses need this information to keep our athletes safe. As basketball and Nordic approach keep in mind that this is a season of constant changes due to the weather. When changes happen we will do our BEST to get word out. Please take the time to have a discussion with your athlete about being a good teammate and what that means and requires. I also want to take a moment to address sportsmanship when it comes to our spectators. We ask that the spectators: let the coaches coach, let the players be play, let the officials officiate, and let the spectators be positive. This means cheering in a way that is supportive and doesn't put anyone down. We want to create a positive environment for all involved. Below is the Section VII policy.

Section VII Spectator Sportsmanship Policy NYSPHSAA Sportsmanship Regulation: Any negative, inappropriate, derogatory comments or actions that brings direct attention to a supervisor or school administrator by a spectator or group of spectators are required to be addressed by the host school, Sectional, or NYSPHSAA representative in the following non-sequential order depending on the comments or behavior: • First warning – Directing the spectator of group of spectators to refrain from any negative comments or actions. • Second warning – A personal discussion with the spectators or group of spectators on the above NYSPHSAA expectations and reminding the spectators or group of spectators of the next step, removal of the game or event, will be utilized if the behavior continues. • Removal from contest – The spectator or group of spectators will be directed to leave the facility for the remainder of the game or event. If spectators or group of spectators refuse to leave the game or event, play will be stopped until they vacate the premise. \* Districts or officials have the right to bypass the steps above based on the severity of the situation.

Penalty for being removed from a game or event: Any spectator removed from a game or event will have a minimum penalty of completing the following 2 courses on NFHSlearn.com – Positive Parenting within School Programs & The Parent Seat and a one game suspension before they are allowed to attend any interscholastic event, home or away. Once the courses are completed the spectator will provide the certificates of completion to the athletic department office. Failure to comply will result in an additional suspension. Schools are required to communicate with the offending spectator on the NYSPHSAA Sportsmanship Spectator Expectations. Depending on the severity of the behavior/comments or future disqualifications by the offending spectator, NYSPHSAA and Section VII may get directly involved in the situation. Note: A school may take additional actions above and beyond the prescribed penalties. Recommendation to Section VII districts: The Section VII Athletic Council is recommending that a designated administrator, game chaperone, security or site supervisor be present at each event. If no such person is present, the responsibility lies with the head coach as a district employee.


