What is Reading Intervention?

Reading intervention is targeted instruction for children who may need extra support to become skillful readers who think deeply about and respond to what they have read. We use a variety of assessments and teacher observations to identify those students who may need additional support. The classroom teacher and the Reading Interventionist work together to make a plan to best meet the needs of the student. Typically, support happens in small groups outside the classroom. The groups are flexible and can change based on review of student progress and data.

How does it work?

Families are notified that their child needs additional reading support.

After a student is identified, the classroom teacher and the Reading Interventionist provide support to help the student increase reading skills. We use a wide variety of materials and techniques to give the child support as needed. These supports may include additional phonemic awareness practice, specific phonics instruction, word analysis skills, reading strategies and targeted comprehension instruction.

Progress monitoring is used to track student progress toward identified goals.

How can I help my child if they need reading intervention?

- Read out loud to your child. Model what fluent reading sounds like.
- Praise your child's reading, no matter what they are reading.
- Make reading part of your family's daily routine.
- Make books accessible to your child. The library has free books at your disposal.
- Be patient with your child's reading. Learning to read takes time and practice.
- Encourage your child to write or draw about what they are reading.
