### WHY ATTENDANCE MATTERS

There's a very strong correlation between good attendance and success in school. On the other hand, students who regularly miss school are also more likely to struggle in school.

Missed days add up quickly: Just two days a month puts a child's success in jeopardy because students fall behind and disconnect. By third grade, it gets much more difficult to catch up. Students who regularly miss school can quickly feel hopeless, and returning becomes harder and harder.

The reasons for chronic absenteeism are understandable but they still need to be addressed. Troubleshooting issues that are keeping a student away from school can make a difference immediately and for the long term. Students with solid attendance are much more likely to be successful during school and after graduation.

### **MORNING DROP OFF**



### TRANSPORTATION REMINDERS

Here are some bus transportation reminders from our transportation department:

- Please keep students home if they are sick!
- Please arrive to the bus stop 5 minutes prior to the bus pickup time
- Seat assignments may be implemented
- Remember to dress warmly. Windows and vents will be open for fresh air
- New student and route changes may take up to five business days
- Kindergarten and Pre-K students must be met at the bus stop by an adult
- Please have students carry a flashlight for their safety when it is dark out
- Students are to comply with the bus rules and bus expectations

- Bus stops are considered a school environment therefore no smoking, drinking or profanity

## IMMUNIZATION INFORMATION

It is important to get an early start on updating your child's immunizations... if you have a current 7th-grader they may be due for their Tdap booster shot which is a requirement of the state. This means that your child needs to go to his/her primary health care provider or call <u>Clatsop County Health</u> <u>Department (503)325-8500</u> to make an appointment for the needed vaccination(s).

Please give all updated immunization information to your child's school office as soon as possible after the immunizations are complete so the school records may be updated!

### 2023-2024 COVID-19 Vaccines are Here

The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has announced that the 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccines are now available in Oregon. The updated mRNA vaccine is recommended for anyone ages 6 months and older. To find an updated COVID-19 vaccine near you, you can search <u>Vaccines.gov</u>.

Getting vaccinated against COVID-19 remains an important tool to protect individual health, as well as the health of your school community. OHA and the Oregon Department of Education recommend that everyone who is eligible and interested in receiving the updated vaccine make a plan and get vaccinated. More information about the updated vaccine can be found in this recent FAQ from OHA.

#### Free At-Home COVID-19 Tests

The federal government has also announced renewed availability of <u>free at-home COVID-19 tests</u>. Every U.S. household can place an order for four free COVID-19 rapid tests delivered to their home. <u>Tests can be ordered online</u> or by phone at 1-800-232-0233

### **SENIOR CHECKLIST**

Senior To Do List: October

- 1. Review your transcript and graduation progress with Mr. Cave.
- 2. Research and tour potential colleges, trade schools, military, or other vocational opportunities you are considering after high school. Help is available from Mr. Cave and Ms. Rislove in the counseling office.
- 3. Start the search for scholarships. Begin with your college of interest and see what is available for incoming freshmen.
- 4. Begin your college applications by using The Common App available at https://www.commonapp.org/
- 5. Ask for letters of recommendation from teachers if needed.
- Submit your college applications by October 31st for early decision or early action. Remember, Early Decision is a binding commitment.

Community colleges offer amazing trade, technical and two-year transfer degrees. Most trade programs or certificates can be finished in just 1-2 years. Examples of these trades include: Culinary Arts, Dental Assisting, Medical Imaging, Automotive Tech, Fire Science, Medical Assisting, Pharmacy Tech, Veterinary Tech, and many more. 

### STUDENT ID'S

All students have been issued their 23-24 student ID. Students need to use their ID to get on/off the bus, to get lunch, to check out library items and to use the school printers. ### **GOAL SETTING PARTNERSHIP**

The Autism Intervention Research Network on Behavioral Health (AIR-B) is partnering with Seaside Schools for the 2023-2024 school year. They are examining the implementation of the Self-Determination Learning Model of Instruction (SDLMI), an intervention supporting self-determination amongst autistic middle and high school students. The Self-Determined Learning Model of Instruction (SDLMI) is an evidence based practice used by teachers to enable students to set goals, develop plans and take steps to attain those goals, and to track their progress over the school trimester.

McKinney Vento Intake Form

<u>Jenny Risner</u> is our District Homeless Liaison and works with school staff and local agencies to identify students who may qualify for homeless status (according to the McKinney-Vento Act.)

If your student or a student you know lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, please contact us.

#### **Who Qualifies**

Anyone lacking a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime resident, including:

- Doubled up, sharing housing due to loss of housing or economic hardship
- In a motel, recreational trailer, or campground
- In an emergency shelter or transitional housing
- Living in cars, parks, or public spaces
- Not in the custody of a parent or guardian
- Migratory student

#### Rights

- Go to school, no matter where they live or how long they have lived there
- Continue in the school that they last attended before becoming homeless
- Receive transportation to the school they last attended
- Enroll in school without giving a permanent address
- Enroll and attend classes while the school arranges for the transfer of immunization records or any other documents required for enrollment

#### Service to Homeless Students Includes

- Enrollment assistance
- Transportation to/from school, if feasible
- Free or reduced meals (breakfast and lunch while at school)
- Food Assistance
- Community resource referrals
- Info About Shelters, Housing & Energy Assistance
- Clothing/Coat/Shoes
- Hygiene Supplies
- Materials required to access education
- Fee Waivers


