Due to the large portion of attendees with English as a second language, the LSSC team met following the event to discuss ways to better support this community and to ensure our events are inclusive and inviting. Some ideas included having more activities for young children, making quieter spaces available for translation services, and offering courses via Zoom for families with transportation or childcare concerns.
