GHS Celebrates with Spirit and Tradition

The Greenville Area School District is taking proactive steps to explore how artificial intelligence (AI) can enhance teaching and learning in safe, thoughtful, and creative ways. This year, the district has formed a dedicated AI Committee under the guidance of GHS Principal for Academic Affairs, Dan Nemeth, comprising teachers from both elementary and high school levels. The committee has been meeting to assess the current use of AI tools in our classrooms and to identify the support teachers and students will need as these technologies continue to evolve.

As part of this initiative, the district is excited to welcome Mr. Eric Curts on October 27th for a professional learning session focused on the effective and responsible use of AI in education. Mr. Curts is a nationally recognized AI and educational technology specialist with 33 years of experience in the field. He currently serves as a Technology Integration Specialist for SPARCC in North Canton, Ohio, and is widely known for his engaging

presentations, practical insights, and passion for empowering educators through technology.

In addition to his training and consulting work with schools and organizations worldwide, Mr. Curts runs the award-winning blog [ControlAltAchieve.com](https://www.controlaltachieve.com), where educators can access hundreds of free technology and AI resources. He is also the author of the book *Control Alt Achieve: Rebooting Your Classroom with Creative Google Projects*.

As a part of this initiative, teachers will be exploring a number of topics related to AI in Education with Eric including AI Use and Misuse, Google Gemini in Schools, Managing Cheating with AI, and How to Write Better AI Prompts. These trainings will help staff feel empowered to safely explore AI with GHS students, ultimately, crafting a learning environment that is both cutting edge and engaging.

Through the work of our committee and the upcoming professional development with Mr. Eric Curts, the Greenville Area School District is committed to helping students and teachers develop safe, supportive, and innovative approaches to AI use in education. By embracing these emerging tools with care and collaboration, we are preparing our classrooms and our learners for the next great evolution in teaching and learning.

New GHS Electives

Digital Photography and Astronomy add two engaging, hands-on options for GHS students.

Greenville High School is expanding learning opportunities for students this year with the addition of two exciting new electives—Introduction to Astronomy and Digital Photography. Both courses have quickly captured student interest, offering unique, hands-on learning experiences that go beyond the traditional classroom.

During third period, science teacher Mr. Matt Scott is guiding students through the wonders of the universe in his new Astronomy course. Designed as an inquiry-based exploration of space, the class invites students to look deeper into the cosmos and uncover how the universe works. Mr. Scott's enthusiasm and positive energy have made the subject come alive for his students. Within just two weeks of opening the course, the class reached maximum capacity with 28 students enrolled—proof of how excited Greenville students are to study the stars.

Over in the technology wing, Mr. Matt Gehly is introducing a brand-new Digital Photography course during seventh period. Mr. Gehly brings years of professional

photography experience into the classroom, offering students a rare opportunity to learn the craft directly from someone who's worked in the field. From mastering camera techniques to exploring creative composition, students are gaining practical skills in a fun, interactive environment. The class comprises students from all grade levels (9–12), creating a dynamic mix of perspectives and creativity.

Both courses demonstrate Greenville's commitment to providing diverse, real-world learning opportunities that ignite curiosity and prepare students for the future. Whether they're studying distant galaxies or capturing the world through a lens, students are exploring new passions & developing lifelong skills, right here at GHS.

Jr. High Intervention

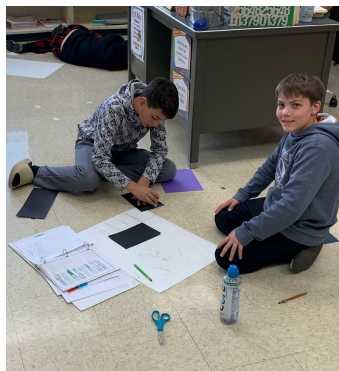
New Schedule Offers Opportunity for Remediation and Enrichment

Greenville Junior High has introduced an exciting new addition to its daily schedule this year — a dedicated intervention period designed to better support student learning and growth. This new structure provides focused time for teachers to help students with academic needs, while also offering opportunities for enrichment and skill development. The intervention period takes place daily, occurring during 5th period for 7th grade students and 6th period for 8th grade students.

As part of this initiative, junior high students have been moved out of traditional study halls with senior high students and are now grouped with junior high teachers during this shared time. This intentional scheduling change allows teachers and students to work together more effectively within a supportive, age-appropriate environment.

The design of the intervention period offers flexibility and purpose. Teachers use this time to help students complete missing or make-up work, provide targeted remediation in essential skills, encourage group collaboration, and offer enrichment opportunities for those who are ready to extend their learning. Whether a student needs extra help mastering a curricular concept or be provided a challenge beyond the day's lesson, this period provides a structured setting for meaningful academic engagement.

"By rearranging the schedule so that junior high teachers and students have a shared period, we've created a time in the day where everyone is available to focus on individual growth," said Principal for Academic Affairs Dan Nemeth. "It's not just about catching up — it's about giving every student the opportunity to reach their full potential."

Early feedback from both students and teachers has been overwhelmingly positive. Students appreciate the chance to get personalized help or explore new topics, while teachers value the dedicated time to connect with students and address their academic needs directly.

The new intervention period is just one of the ways Greenville Junior High continues to focus on supporting the whole student — providing structure, flexibility, and care to ensure that every learner can succeed. It is also a primary example of the district-wide emphasis on continued academic growth.

State-testing Math Growth

Greenville's math department has earned well-deserved recognition for its exceptional student progress on state assessments. According to the recently released PVAAS (PA Value-Added Assessment System) data from the Spring 2025 testing window, GHS achieved an impressive 94 growth rating in mathematics — a reflection of both student effort and high-quality instruction.

This outstanding result highlights the dedication of our math teachers, whose commitment to student learning continues to drive success. Special credit goes to Ms. Marleen Meyer (7th Grade PSSA), Ms. Madison Hawthorne (8th Grade PSSA), and Mrs. Susan Risavi (Algebra 1 Keystone) for the significant growth their students demonstrated during the past testing cycle.

The entire school community celebrates this achievement and the positive impact these educators have made on student learning. Congratulations to our math department for setting such a strong example of academic excellence and growth!

Electronic Device Policy

GHS Device Policy Shows Strong First-Quarter Impact and Adherence

At the start of this school year, our high school introduced a new Electronic Device Policy designed to reduce distractions, increase engagement, and promote more meaningful social interactions among students. After one quarter of implementation, the results have been overwhelmingly positive.

Under the policy:

First offense: The student's device is turned in to the office for the remainder of the day.

Second offense: A parent or

guardian must pick up the device from the office.

Third offense: The student is required to turn in their device each morning for 30 days.

Since implementing these expectations, the vast majority of students have shown great responsibility and cooperation. Out of 586 students, only 8 reached a second offense, and just 2 received a third offense during the first quarter. These numbers demonstrate that students are adhering to the policy and adjusting well to the expectations.

The positive effects have also been confirmed by teachers. In a recent staff survey:

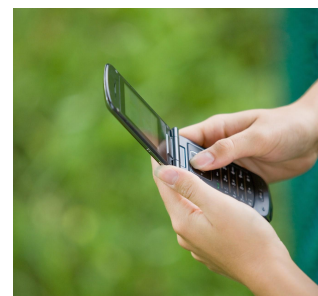
83.3% of teachers reported a **significant** increase in classroom engagement.

79.2% observed a **significant** reduction in classroom distractions.

87.5% noted a **significant** increase in social interactions among students.

One anonymous teacher responded, "Student's creativity and effort on assignments has improved significantly, they're no longer just rushing to get on to their phone."

These outcomes reflect a meaningful shift in school culture — one where students are more present, more connected, and more engaged in their learning.



We appreciate the cooperation of our students, staff, and families in supporting this policy. Together, we are creating an environment that fosters focus, connection, and academic success.

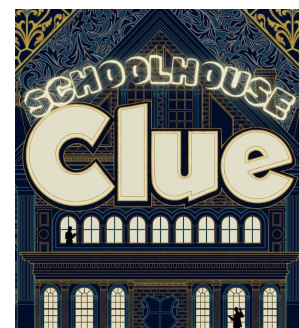

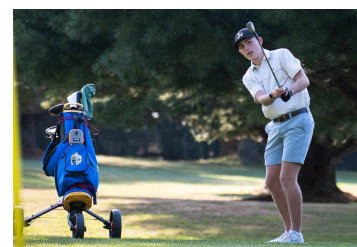

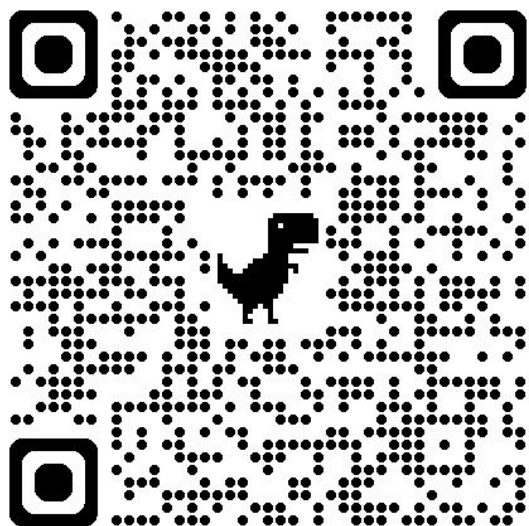
her four years," recalling moments like watching Dallin and Ada's spirited push-up competitions during breaks.
